




Dedication



Mr. John Wilson was born in Gourock, Scotland, and came to Canada as a child. His family settled on a farm west of Innisfail, where he lived until 1959, when he moved into the town proper. All his formal education was taken at the rural school near his home.

His divergent interests include curling and golf. He is a rifle shooting champion: he started in the Dominion Rifle Shooting Competition in 1928, and has won several provincial championships, and the Dominion Small Bore Championship, once.

We wish to acknowledge at least some of Mr. Wilson's many contributions in the fields of agriculture and education.

He is internationally known as an exhibitor, judge, and producer of purebred sheep. One of the more than one thousand awards he has received for sheep and wool exhibits at fairs, is the world grand championship for wool, which he has been awarded six times. At present he is President of Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, Chairman of the Canada Sheep Producers' Council, and President of the Canadian Sheep Breeders' Association. He also is the longest continuous director of the Alberta Livestock Association. And he has been a director of the Calgary Exhibition for the past six years. All this has rightfully earned him membership in the Canadian Agriculture Hall of Fame.

Mr. Wilson's contributions to his community have likewise been outstanding. He has served as chairman of the Innisfail Municipal Hospital Board for many years. In education, he has served as school-trustee; Chairman of the School Committee, County of Red Deer; and Vice-chairman of the Red Deer Junior College Board since its inception. The John Wilson Elementary School, Innisfail, is named after him.

We consider it an honor and a privilege to have in our community a man who has contributed so much to our College, his county, and in fact, to our country.

To him, we respectfully dedicate this "Legacy".

council, vice-president; yearbook advertising, and dance club. One of her hobbies is skiing. A sociology major, she hopes to do social work in the future.




David Earl Freeman

Rae Ellen Kimball






Darlene Judy Letwinetz

Marcia Helen Parsons



Drama at the college.




Michael David Sawyer


Patricia Cody

The Festival


