

Mrs. Scott's greatest contribution is as a member of the Red Deer School Board. She began with the School Board in January, 1947, as a part-time worker. In 1953, she became a full-time employee. The Board has undertaken an extensive building program, including the Vocational School, and the administrative duties of the Composite High School.

A Provisional Board of the Red Deer Junior College was formed before the Board proper was formed in 1963. Mrs. Scott was secretary of the Provisional Board and secretary of the Board proper until a full-time secretary was appointed in July of 1966.

We consider it an honor to have Mrs. Scott as a member of our community, and wish to thank her for her contribution to the Red Deer Junior College.


Gaye Abrey

also wrote for the Accent semi-occasionally.








Wendy Bannerman




Marilyn Fuder


Susan Gorrill


Barbara Loucks








Marilyn Moore










Mary Newton


Jo-Anne Corsiatto












Arthur McDermand


Jackie Robinson





The Intramurals were probably the most successful series of extracurricular events at the College. There were four houses each for men and women — Blue, Gold, Green, and Red (in alphabetical order, please note).

The first activity was rugger (speedball for

And quality pays. Because the Grand Aggregate trophy, presented on Commencement Night, went to Green House.








Commencement
