A new era in the history of education in Central Alberta had begun.

When the auditorium lights went out at the opening of Red Deer Junior College, The new Dean, Peter Raffa said, "and let there be light." When recently interviewed, Dean Raffa recalled that upon his words the light returned.

Peter Raffa graduated from the University of Alberta in 1946 with Baccalaureates in both Arts and Education. The position of principal at the Bashaw High School was where he spent the next seven years. Following Bashaw, he held a position for two years at the Griesback Barracks and then served as a principal for seven years in Sherwood Park. In 1964, at a time when he was attempting to complete his Ph.D. thesis, Mr. Raffa accepted the position of Dean at the newly opening Red Deer Junior College.

The college arose from the efforts of the community. People felt that a local college would reduce the cost incurred by students in Central Alberta. The profile of the college was greatly increased by the persistence with which Mr. Raffa visited the high schools in the area. He would encourage the principals, most

of them friends of his, to try and persuade their students to attend Red Deer Junior College for their first years of post-secondary education. Enrollment was especially important to Mr. Raffa as he saw this as his single biggest challenge. His efforts were successful as enrollment each year was higher than the predicted numbers.

He felt that involving students in the decision making process of the college was important.

Mr. Raffa also seems to have a lot of faith in the ability of the students to contribute to the growth of the college. He immediately set up a Student's Association and later credited them with getting second year university transfer programs at Red Deer College. He also suggested that students sit on the Board of Governors as observers.

Mr. Raffa was asked what he felt had

changed substantially since the beginning. During an interview, he emphasized that one of the most noticeable changes was that the students of recent years have tended to be much more informal than in the sixties. In the early years, the instructors were addressed by title (Sir, Mam, or Doctor). In recent years the majority of instructors have been on a first name basis with students. Dress codes are another area that have become more informal. The students of the past were required to dress in a particular fashion and it was required that the male students keep a shorter hair style. It was recently noticed that almost anything

Mr. Raffa is retiring from the college this year. He resigned as president for health reasons in 1971 but has remained with the college in various capacities since then. Upon his retirement Peter Raffa possibly plans to continue the writing of doctoral thesis to complete his Ph.D. It has been an honor and a privilege to have had Mr. Raffa at the college for the last 25 years. May his next 25 years be as fruitful and fulfilling as his time at Red Deer College.

The Early Years

Red Deer College may have been the first public college in the city but it was preceded by several similar institutions established by church groups.

In 1892, the Dominion Government and the Mission Board of the Methodist Church began construction of an "Indian Industrial School" which would ease the transition, it was hoped, for the young native people from the hunting and trading era of the past into the pioneer agricultural life that was developing. Indian girls received instruction in domestic science and academic work. Indian boys received training in College. carpentry, blacksmithing and farming plus some academic education. The school had accommodation for 150 children at a time when Red Deer was a mere flag stop on he newly constructed Calgary-Edmonton railway.

In 1908 the Sisters of Wisdom began operation of St. Joseph's Covenant which was able to accommodate 50 girls and 25 boys as boarders. Although it was a Catholic convent, several Protestant families sent their children to St. Joseph's as it was the only boarding school in the area.

In 1912 the "Presbyterian Ladies' College" was established on 10 acres of land donated by Henry Jamison. This building still stands as a part of Michener Centre. By 1916 it had become clear that enrollment wasn't adequate to maintain the college and the facilities were sold to the provincial government.

In 1930 the Canadian Nazarene College opened on the site now occupied by Canada Safeway on Gaetz Avenue. Although this institution proved to be economically viable, the growth of Red Deer made it advantageous to sell the land and move the college to Winnipeg.

Attempts in the past to establish colleges in Red Deer may have proved short-lived but they indicate that an interest in education has always existed in Red Deer. It was this same belief in the benefits of higher learning that motivated the founders of Red Deer The term "student life" had a very different meaning for those attending RDC during its first years of operation. The college was then a part of the composite high school. It have been because of this but was more likely a reflection of The college calender also outlined the that era that Red Deer College students had more rules to follow in the sixties.

Regular attendance was mandatory in all courses. Students could be disallowed from writing final examinations if they consistently missed classes. If a student was absent they were required to report to the Dean in order to obtain an absentee report. Arriving late to class was also counted as an absence unless the student could convince the instructor that they had a legitimate excuse.

Under the heading of "Dress and Personal Grooming" in the college calender it stated; "It is expected that students will use their good judgement and discretion in this matter, with emphasis upon cleanliness and neatness, rather than upon formality. At the same time, slacks for the ladies and blue jeans and t-shirts for the men will not constitute proper dress. The restriction on slacks for the lady students will be relaxed during periods of cold

weather." Further, Dean Raffa was responsible for seeing to it that his male students did not allow their hair to grow too long.

proper means of addressing members of the faculty. "In the case of male instructors the word "Sir" can be used; also "Mister" or "Professor" with the instructors name as for example "Mr. Smith" or "Professor Smith". Lady professors are addressed as "Miss Smith" or "Mrs. Smith". Instructors with doctors' degrees are addressed as "Doctor Smith" whether male or female, but never by the term "doctor" alone. A similar rule applies to the Dean. Never use the term of "Dean" alone as a mode of address."

Further, college policy dictated that students would apply themselves to their studies and conduct themselves in a proper manner. The consumption or possession of liquor on campus or at college sponsored activities was strictly prohibited. A violation of these rules could lead to the expulsion of the student from classes.


The stricter climate of the sixties did



not prevent the students from enjoying the college experience, however. There was a heavy emphasis on participation in extra curricular activities. Student government involved a higher proportion of the student body and the successes of the college sports teams were enjoyed by the entire student body. The intra-mural department of the college had a motto, "An activity for everyone and everyone in an activity." This motto could be said to apply to the college as a whole in its early years.













Bachelor of Arts – History


The Bachelor of Arts program began as one of the first programs offered at the Red Deer Junior College in 1964. During the years 1964-1970 the college was affiliated with the U. of A. and offered only first year transfer programs. In 1970, the college came under the Alberta Colleges Act of 1969 and was able to offer two year transfer programs.

During the years between 1972 and 1978, the department was involved in making decisions concerning the internal operation of the program. In the discussion of these issues two separate departments arose from the old Department of Liberal Arts: the Department of English and the Department of Arts. In 1975/76 the departments were discussing the issues of promoting the B.A. program and possibly creating a two year Associate of Arts degree to increase retention of second year students. In 1978, a divisional retreat was held that dealt with issues ranging from college climate to the expression of individual freedom. This retreat marked a significant turning point for the division and the relationship of the individuals and departments with one another and as a consequence the division has worked more smoothly.

The divisional workshop of 1979 was devoted for the first time to the purpose of a Liberal Arts education at RDC. The discussions produced an agreement on a number of broad goals for the student including the development of self responsibility, critical thinking, awareness of ones values, and the development of literary skills. The English Department's proposal for a program to improve students literary skills became the basis for the *Learning Assistance Program* that was initiated in 1981.

The renewed emphasis on the common purpose of Liberal Arts education and the possibility of offering senior courses within the framework of the B.A. program saw the two departments merge into the present Department of Humanities and Social Sciences.

Rehabilitation-History

In the early 1970's, the focus of care for the mentally handicapped changed from a custodial-institutional model to a model which advocated the integration of handicapped individuals into the community. This change in philosophy and focus created a need for a new professional in the helping field; namely, someone who could teach the handicapped individual the skills necessary to live independently as possible in the community.

The Department of Advanced Education created what came to be known as the RUSH committee to quickly establish a curriculum for a two year training program for this new professional—a Rehabilitation Practitioner. The new training program was established at Red Deer College in 1974 and thirty-three students enrolled. Nineteen students received their diploma in 1976.

The Rehab Program graduates around 40 students each year. Courses in the program now have transferability to the University of Calgary toward a B. Ed. degree. A new profession was created at Red Deer College and is very much alive and well in 1989.


















Social Services - History

The Social Service Program has been a part of Red Deer College since the fall of 1969. The program was created in response to the need in the Central Alberta Region for trained social work personnel. Under the leadership of the programs first chairperson, Don Snow, the first class graduated in 1971. During the early 1970's the Social Service Program gained a reputation for excellence and grew rapidly.

In 1976 the Social Service Program was the first in Alberta to become fully transferable to the University of Calgary.

The program has grown from an initial size of fifteen in 1969 to thirty students in 1988. During the 1980's the program has been brokered with great success by the Community Vocational Centre in Slave Lake and by Yukon College.

Graduates of the program have been highly successful in transferring to other post-secondary institutions to obtain their B.S.W. degree and in obtaining social work positions in the Central Alberta region.




Teacher's Aide - History

The Teacher's Aide Certificate Program began at Red Deer College in September of 1975. Originally designed to train people to assist teachers with noninstructional tasks, the curriculum had a fairly heavy emphasis on clerical skills and office procedures. The enrollment in the early years of the program fluctuated from eight to fifteen students and mainly attracted the homemaker who wanted to return the work force either full or part time. The program had a part time coordinator and various part time instructors along with instructors from existing areas of the college who provided service courses.

By 1981 the enrollment had increased to 25 students, a full time coordinator and one other full time faculty member had been hired. The funding for the program was incorporated into the College's base budget with approval from the Department of Advanced Education. With this growth it was possible to expand the course offerings and to begin offering more courses emphasizing ways to assist the teacher with instructional tasks. In addition, special education courses were introduced as the demand for aides to work in this area increased.

Today the program has a quota of 30 students but normally receives approximately 90 applications each year. From one-half to two-thirds of the students are mature students and most are interested in full time work with the special needs students or as a general classroom assistant in the elementary grades.

The Early Childhood Development program at Red Deer College began in the fall of 1975 with 16 full time students in a certificate program. In the fall of 1981 the program expanded to include a two year diploma course. Currently there are 35 diploma students, 60 certificate programs and approximately 100 part- time students in outreach communities. There are also full-time certificate programs in Hobbema and Wetaskiwin. In the summer of 1989 the ECD program will offer the first courses in its new Special Needs Post-Diploma program.

Students in the program take a variety of courses to provide them with the opportunity to gain the knowledge and skills needed to work with young children and their families. There is an emphasis on practising the theory learned in the courses. The department operates its own lab, Play Matters, where students have the opportunity to observe and work in a model child care setting which implements the beliefs and values of the program. Play Matters includes infants, toddlers, and ECS children.

Graduates of the program readily find employment in a range of programs and services relating to young children. Many graduates continue studies in early childhood through post-diploma programs in special needs and day care administration. University degrees in education, child studies, and family studies also extend the career ladder of the graduates.


















A.A.Y.C. by Hayley Millington

















Bachelor of Education – History

In 1964, the Red Deer Junior College opened in a new wing of L.T.C.H.S. with an enrollment of 24 in Arts, 28 in Sciences, and 54 in Education. Through the years, education has retained its number one position in university transfer enrollment. The faculty originally started with three instructors teaching different courses pertaining only to the education field.

In the early 1970's, Ed. Practicum was added to the program. Red Deer College was the first in Alberta and one of the first in Canada to offer what is now being called "early field experience". The University of Alberta and the university o Calgary started to offer similar courses modeled after Red Deer's in the early 1980's.

Over the past 28 years hundreds of students have passed through the Teacher Education program en route to successful careers in the teaching profession. It has indeed been most gratifying to be associated with talented individuals; initially as students, and a short while later as colleagues.



















Theatre Studies – History

The Theatre Studies Program in performance and technology was instituted at Red Deer College in the fall of 1986. The Arts Centre was opening at this time and there was an opportunity for the Department of Drama and its professional staff to work with the new facility and to showcase student talent. The department was able to form a fine founding company from students cultivated within the community, and it developed a reputation for the quality of its show production organization, Centre Stage. The department had developed a wide range of university transfer courses and within a months notice of authorization the program had a full complement of students and was running at full speed. Lass than two months into the first semester Centre Stage, in conjunction with the Central Alberta Theatre, staged the feature production of the Arts Centre opening, THE MUSIC MAN.

In the last two and a half years, the Theatre Studies Program has put on twenty three different shows, A MID-SUMMER NIGHTS DREAM was the first ever Shakespeare production to grace mainstage and FIGHTING DAYS was our first production by a published Canadian playwright. While most of the shows are cast with a blending of students, community members and visiting artists and staged with the assistance of professional craftsmen, TWELFTH NIGHT was the first to be directed by a visiting professional, the internationally renowned Mr. Tom Kerr.


In the eight months since July '88 the program has produced an average of one show per month. The program has been consistent in its original objectives: to provide students with learning experience so that they might make a living in theatre through the course of extended study or work or to select to

make theatre a part of their lives by making a living with an alternate ca-

The program now has approximately three applicants for every space available in Fall 1989. The majority of applicants are from centres outside Red Deer.

The most remarkable features of the Theatre Studies Program have been those shaped by the students who have left their mark upon it through their roles in building and playing in productions, through their growth as performers and craftsmen, and through their impact on program changes.





School of Music - History

The Red Deer College School of Music commenced operations in the fall of 1978 with the given mandate of meeting the educational needs of the musical community in Central Alberta. The 1978/79 term saw the School of Music provide performance ensemble transfer credit in Concert Band, Concert Choir, and Jazz Ensemble while establishing a comprehensive workshop and festival program. Private and group instruction opportunities serviced approximately one hundred community registrants. During this year the ground work was laid for a two year diploma program in Contemporary Music Performance—Merchandising and the Bachelor of Music University Transfer Program.

Over the past ten years the School of Music has enriched the musical climate of the College and Community by bringing to Red Deer an impressive listing of teachers and performers, drawing from throughout North America and Europe, to serve as instructors and/or workshop leaders.

The 1987/88 term saw the School of Music broaden its base to include the re-introduction of the Bachelor of Music University Transfer Program. In total the School of music boasts a full and part time faculty of twenty five professionals. The quota for the Contemporary Performance—Merchandising Program was redefined during this term to accommodate a maximum of 45 students in the first and second year of studies.

The musical quality of students seeking admittance into this program has improved over the years. Inquiries come from throughout Canada though the main source of students is still that area of the province defined as Calgary north and border to border.

The Early Years Continue...

overnight. On March 9, 1959, the Boards of the Red Deer School District #104 and Red Deer School Division #35 held a joint meeting and decided to pursue the idea of a college for Red Deer. Members of those boards, Bob Jewell, Chuck Morton, Mrs. Margaret Parsons and School Superintendent Harold Dawe worked tirelessly, untangling the bureaucratic web that stood between them and incorporation.

Mr.'s Jewell and Morton formed a building committee and searched for land for the campus, anticipating quickly outgrowing Lindsay Thurber Comprehensive High School, where classes were held for the first four years. They settled on the Banting farm, a 320 acre parcel of land. The land was purchased by the school board and the city paid for it, then donated 120 acres to the College for the future campus.

Harold Dawe describes appearing before the Junior Colleges Committee to present a case for Red Deer Junior College: "It was a grueling experience. but they did recommend affiliation for one year." The meeting wasn't going well, when Dr. Max Wyman of the U of A Science Department spoke up and said, "We started the U of A Science Department with a candle and a bit of string.....let's give them a chance." The atmosphere of the meeting changed and the affiliation was granted.

The Red Deer Junior College Board met for the first time in January of 1964. Mrs. Parsons, who had chaired the Provisional College Board was elected Chairman of the Board, a position she held until 1969.

A wing of Lindsay Thurber welcomed students in September of 1964 with 24 Arts students, 28 Science students and 54 Education students being met by Dean Peter Raffa, a faculty of ten and a library assistant. Many of the instructors taught in the high school as well. Students paid fees of \$150 a year, if they were from the area, for 1st year University Transfer courses. If they were from

Colleges don't happen by accident nor outside the areas served by the school that was punctuated by two brawls boards that participated in creating the College, fees were \$300 for Arts and Education and \$50 more for Science.

> Students shared the gymnasium with the high school, but had their own lecture rooms, a common room for activities and three science labs. The first The Advocate observed, in 1964: "It's Student Union was formed, with the students electing Pete Weddell, President; Jean Bailey, Secretary Treasurer; Mary Lou Taylor, Vice President and Ken Potter, Social Convener. Sandy Sackville edited the first yearbook. The Junior College Kings and Queens Basketball teams were created and started our championship tradition by losing most of their games. A freshman hockey

and ended in a 9-1 College defeat. That, as the saying goes, was then, and this is now. The first SA also picked the school colours, formulated and adopted a constitution and designed a dashing

never difficult to identify College students (at the Comp)—the typical college student carries his nose approximately one inch higher in the air than does the average high school student."

As enrollment climbed, the pressure was on to develop the current campus, and a budget was submitted to the government that included a fine arts team challenged the Comp to a contest centre with a price tag of \$517,641.

The Early Years Continue...

Changing priorities delayed the development of the Arts Centre until 1984, when it came in at \$15 million. Governor General Roland Michener officially opened the 250,000 square foot Red Deer Junior College building on a bitterly cold November 2, 1967, and the building opened for classes, with a capacity for 1200 students, in the fall of 1968. Enrollment was pegged at 402, in 20 undergraduate fields of study. In 1969, with 38 faculty, Junior was dropped from the name and the campus expanded to three floors in the administration building and second floor classrooms on either side of the library. A year later, after much lobbying by Students' Association and Administration alike, the College was granted the right to offer second year University Transfer Programs. In 1971, President Peter Raffa resigned after seven years due to ill health. Dr. Grant Fisher had taken over as Acting President and then he was succeeded by Dr. M. Eastman.

In 1972, hard times fell on Red Deer College. Enrollments were below what had been anticipated, which led to classes being cancelled. Irreconcilable difficulties arose between the Administration and the Board of Governors on one side and the faculty and student body on the other. Two non confidence votes, one by students, one by faculty led to the Byrne Inquiry, set up to examine the problems on campus. Forty four briefs were heard at Camille J.

LaRouge, resulting in sweeping changes in the Board and Administration. The growing pains then subsided and the remaining staff got after the task of rebuilding this young College's reputation, while construction workers completed extensive additions to the building including townhouse and apartment residences, the Kevin Sirois Gymnasium, library, cafeteria, data centre, bookstore and laboratories.

In 1972, the Worth Commission Report on Education estimated that enrollment

LaRouge, resulting in sweeping changes in the Board and Administration. The growing pains then subsided and the remaining staff got after the would range between 1000 and 1600 students until 1990, but the oil boom fooled them and enrollment in 1983 was approximately 2500.

A new Board of Governors was appointed in 1973, chaired by Dr. R.C. Cooper, and Dr. Bill Forbes became President. A year later, the Red Deer College Permanent Art Collection was begun, marking the tenth anniversary of the College.
















College Preperatory – History

The College Preparatory Program began in 1968 with 45 students and four instructors. In the beginning, all of the students were sponsored by Alberta Vocational Training and the curriculum was that of the Alberta Correspondence School. By 1969, the College had taken control of the curriculum and was the recipient of a Canada Manpower grant to operate an adult upgrading program. As the program grew, it began to service the upgrading needs of a variety of programs in the College. By April of 1970 the Adult Upgrading students no longer wrote the Alberta diploma examinations and the program had become independent of the provincial curriculum. The needs of our adult students began to the curriculum design of the courses within the program. In 1978 the program was renamed to better reflect its main goal- that is, to provide developmental education to adults who lack the skills or high school credentials to enter the post-secondary programs at the College. The College Preparatory Program grew steadily until 1986 when enrollment leveled off at its highest levelapproximately 400 students in each of the Fall and Winter terms and another 150 students in the Spring/Summer term. The program now has 16 full-time instructors and up to 16 part-time instructors. College Preparatory courses are offered in Stettler, Rocky Mountain House, and the Bowden Institution. The goal of the program is to help adults gain access to higher levels of academic achievement. Some students use the High School Equivalency Diploma to gain better jobs that require high school diplomas, some enter diploma and certificate programs at Red Deer College, and others go on to other schools, colleges, or universities all over North America.

Trades and Technologies

Tucked away in the east wing of the college is the Trades and Technologies wing. Many of the programs offered in the Trades and Technologies wing are apprenticeships, with participants designated by the Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Division. Four years of apprenticeship training are available for Carpenters, Motor Mechanics, Electricians, Plumbers and Heavy Duty Mechanics. Autobody Technicians, Tilesetters, Sprinkler Fitters and Welders can acquire three years of apprenticeship training, while Cement Finishers and Water Well Drillers have two years of training available to them. In addition, the Apprenticeship Division offers Journeyman Upgrading, in a number of areas.












Soccer


Legal Assistant – History

Red Deer College began offering the Legal Assistant Program in 1975. The program was originally called the Law Clerk Program. The name was changed in 1982, however the terms Legal Assistant, Law Clerk and Paralegal are often used interchangeably.

The program has grown from 25 students in 1978 to over 90 students at the present time. In addition, Red Deer College began offering a Legal Assistant Program in Calgary in 1978. The program has approximately 150-200 students and was designed as a program to upgrade the skills of Legal Secretaries.

Red Deer College is a founding member of the Alberta Association of Legal Assistants and in addition hosted the last national symposium for Legal Assistants. The program has also participated in two student exchanges: one with Ahunsic college in Montreal, and the other with Cape Breton College.







Computer Systems Technology – History


The Computer Systems Technology (CST) program was started in 1982 and is a two year diploma program targeted at producing graduates to enter the work force as computer programmer/analysts in computer installations pertaining to business. The program has undergone considerable change since its inception, reflecting the rapid changes that are continuing to occur in the applications of computers in business.

The program runs for ten months each year, with a work experience component in the last two terms of the second year. The overall emphasis in the program is a "hands-on" practical approach, with students being expected to develop and build computer based systems, both individually and in groups. The program has a restricted intake of 30 a year. Typically the class consists of a majority of mature students, returning to college for career change reasons. The diverse background of the class enables students to learn from each others experiences, and help to put computers in an applied business perspective.


In the 1973/74 college year, three major programs were made available: General, Legal, and Medical. That same year an office work experience program was initiated.





The Recreation Administration program was started in 1975 when Ian Reid was hired to develop a two year university transfer program in conjunction with the Physical Education Department. The fall semester of 1975 actually had no "recreation core" subjects. The first of these were added in the winter term of 1975/76. Enrollment began with about 5 students and has grown to the present level of 70 students.

A program tradition, the fall orientation, was first held in 1977 with the first weekend orientation trip happening in 1978. The first trips were back-packing trips held to Ram River Falls. These orientations are now held every fall at the Goldeye Centre located near Nordegg.

In 1982, a Red Deer student, Cari Vaselenak won the Halladay Award recognizing the provinces top Recreation Administration student. Since that time, Red Deer College has won the award six years in a row.

In 1979, the Recreation Student Society initiated the Sylvia Grebiuk Scholarship which was later changed to the Ian Reid Scholarship in recognition of his contribution to the program.







Some things never change

Editing a campus newspaper and maintaining an acceptable GPA remains the biggest challenge. Dorothy Bourne got the newspaper up and running in September, and then turned the reins over to Brenda Meisner, in November. Barry Mason, fresh from the Canadian University Press Conference became Editor in January, and was still doing it at press time. Twenty two years ago, the situation was similar evident in the following copy, an excerpt from the 1967 yearbook, the Legacy:

"The first thing that happened to the student newspaper this year was a change of name. The previous year, its first year of publication, the paper had gone under the name "Periscope".

Although the Accent was not published regularly throughout the year, the newspaper managed to achieve a state somewhat resembling organization. A bank account was established, a cash box and other equipment purchased, and a vain attempt to establish a schedule was made. The first two issues, following the example of the previous year, were printed at the College on the Gestetner. Since these papers were not well received by the student body, it was decided that the paper should be commercially printed, and five subsequent issues were done in this manner. The greatest and most constant difficulty encountered by the staff was a lack of it (staff, that is).

A newspaper can be the voice of the student body only if the students are willing to speak."

Students did raise issues throughout the year, with the staff (now called Bricksters, not Brickies) receiving both accolades and criticism for their Now, these are Brickies! event). Never daunted, this collection of individuals will present the student body with 180 pages of campus news and photos by the end of April. In September, seventeen neophyte journalists attended the first organizational meeting and came face to face with the ugliest eight letter word in all newspaperdom, deadline. Their spare time over the next eight months would be consumed by writing, editing, reporting, cutting, pasting, selling ads and delivering a fresh Bricklayer every second Friday. And freshit is, featuring spot colour every issue and printed on Electrobrite, this year's Bricklayer goes off to assail its other Alberta counterparts in the ACTISEC newspaper contest. As we go to press, the judges are poring over its pages, and the Bricksters are slaving over another issue. And our fingers are crossed.

Bachelor of Sciences-History

When Red Deer Junior College began in September, 1964, its Bachelor of Science component had three faculty members teaching six courses to approximately 40 university transfer science students. The number of university transfer science instructors has grown to over 35 who teach more than 80 courses to close to 600 students who are in B.Sc. or Technology programs. Red Deer College currently offers the first year or the first two years of B.Sc. programs in more than 20 disciplines and pre-professional programs in five different professional programs.

The college has offered B.Sc. transfer programs in Agriculture, Architecture, Chemistry, Home Economics, and General B.Sc. along with the Pre-Dentistry, Pre-Medicine, and Pre-Veterinary programs since the beginning of the institution in 1964. In the next four or five years the university transfer science programs grew into more comprehensive career program offerings. First year of B.Sc. in Pharmacy was offered in 1966/67 and the first year programs in Computer Science and Engineering were started in 1967/ 68. By 1970 the number of faculty and students in B.Sc. Transfer programs had close tripled and by this year had increased almost ten-fold.

Not all of the programs which started during the first few years of the college are still with us. For example, the Medical Lab Science program which started in 1966/67, the Medical Records Librarian program (1967/68), and the Architecture Program (1964/65) have all disappeared. On the other hand, our B.Sc. programs have grown over the years to represent a healthy proportion of the total college population.

The Chemical Technology program was started in 1977/78 and the Biological Science Technology program was started in 1981/82 each with 5 students. Today, each of these programs takes 15 students.

















Nursing Program – History


In January 1965 the Red Deer General Hospital Board established a Committee on Education to investigate the possibility of establishing a nursing program at Red Deer. A feasability study was done and the recommendations resulted in approval being granted to establish a nursing program at Red Deer College. The first students were admitted in September,

The stated purposes of the program were to prepare graduates to give patient centred nursing care in the beginning staff positions at institutions providing acute and long term care, and to qualify the graduates for registration in the Province of Alberta.

The initial program was 74 weeks of study which included nursing courses as well as support courses from physical, social and biological sciences and the humanities. In 1974 the faculty initiated an increase in program length to 78 weeks in order to strengthen the clinical component, and this was lengthened again in 1982 to 88 weeks.

When the program began the quota was for 36 students. This increased to 72 in 1976 and to 80 in 1983. Faculty members also increased from 7 to the current 20 full time positions.

Future planning for the RDC Nursing Program is to provide opportunity for students to complete baccalaureate nursing at Red Deer in addition to the diploma program. A collaborative program proposal has been developed with the U. of A. nursing faculty and that proposal is moving through the approval process.


Trades and Technical Training - History

In 1977, a joint venture between the community and Red Deer College produced the first of the vocational courses at Red Deer College. It was a Pre-Employment Welding Program and was offered at an off campus location. From this beginning, the Trades and Technical Training Division of Red Deer College has grown into a full Apprenticeship Training Program that offers training in 11 different trades. The first real apprenticeship program was added in 1979, when a Tilesetting program was initiated. In 1980, the Apprenticeship Division was officially formed and facilities were leased for temporary housing of ten apprenticeship programs. In 1981 plans were developed for the construction of a Trades and Tech. wing at the college and construction officially commenced in 1982. Program lengths were extended in 1982 and by 1984, eleven full apprenticeship programs were being offered in eleven different trades. In 1984 staff reached a peak of sixty-five from a beginning of eight in 1980. Economic downturn in 1985 saw a decrease in enrollment and employment, but all programs remained intact. In 1988, a pilot project in Competency Based Apprenticeship Training was begun for Welding and Carpentry.


Since 1987, Red Deer College has operated a Transitional/Vocational Program for mildly mentally handicapped adults who reside in the community independently or with some support services. The goal of the program is to provide skill training and related classroom activities for the students. Classroom instruction serves to provide knowledge of necessary skills needed for successful adaptation to community living and employment. Skill training takes place in community settings suitable to the students' abilities and interests. The program operates ten months of the year from September to June and culminates with a six week full time practicum work experience.
