Red Deer College Kings opened the 1973-74 A.C.A.C. Basketball season with a pair of victories over the host Grande Prairie College Cougars this weekend. In the Friday night opener, the Kings started quickly and led 31-20 at half time but then faded, just managing to hold on for a 58-52 win. The pattern reversed on Saturday just prior to half time to overtake the Cougars and gain a 35-32 lead at intermission. Then, Kings switched to a half-court trap pressure defence and dominated the second half to win going away 67-47. Lionel Leiske scored 25 points in the second game while Gord Graves picked off 22 rebounds. Scoring for the Kings in the two games totalled as follows: Leiske - 39, Graves - 23, Grieb - 19, Bob Dublanko - 13, Bill Bowd - 12, Blaine Kriek - 11, Greg Lunde - 5, Rick David - 2, and Tim Guilbault - 1.

Kings will now break until January 4th when they will play against the University of Alberta in Edmonton.

SENIOR MEN'S LEAGUE

Despite considerable experimentation with various personnel combinations, Kings defeated Crestomere Clippers quite comfortably, 62-41 at the College Gym, in Senior Men's play last Monday. This Monday, December 10th, the Kings play their last game prior to Christmas, when they host the Lindsay Thurber Comprehensive Raiders at 8:30 P.M. in the College Gym.
