## L. R. C. NOTES

If you want to mention current problems of inflation, the last federal election or the recent population conference in your term paper and would like to get the facts right, where do you find them?

You ask your friendly librarian, of course. But suppose he or she is already trying to locate something for someone else, or you're the independent type and like to do things for yourself?

Right again. You head for the magazines (or periodicals or serial publications - whatever you want to call them) which - because they are published so frequently - contain the most up to date information we have.

But rather than thumb through recent issues of TIME or MACLEANS in the hope of locating something, it's best to make use of the specialized periodical indexes, such as Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature (located in the A section of the L.R.C.), Business Periodicals Index (HF 5001), Canadian Education Index (L), Cumulative Index to Nursing Literature (RT 1), Applied Science and Technology Index (T.A6), A.B.C. Pol. Sci. (JA1), Psychological Abstracts (BF 1) and so on, depending on your subject. These will all lead you to the titles of specific articles, and name the magazine issues that contain them.

But before you get too psyched up over the goodies you've discovered, better check the little Linedex file on the checkout desk to see whether we subscribe to all those magazines. If we do, fine - you can track down the articles immediately. But if we don't, it may be some time before we can get the stuff for you on inter-library loan. Still, we receive about 750 magazines here, so it should be possible to find something. Let us know if you can't.

Incidentally, we hope we'll soon be able to replace the Linedex file with computer-produced listings of all our periodical holdings, which would make it a lot easier for everyone to find them.

We like to keep up to date too!

## RACQUETBALL RESULTS

Edmonton players dominated the final standings of the first Red Deer College Athletic Board Open Racquetball Tournament held at the College this weekend, as Edmontonians John Van Riper and Gary Luck won the men's A and B events respectively. LaVerne Dzuren of Lethbridge was the women's open event winner, and Al Isbister of Red Deer won the men's C event championship. A total of 41 players competed in the 3-day event - 18 from Edmonton, 11 from Red Deer, 5 each from Lethbridge and Calgary, and 2 from Medicine Hat.

In the A event final, provincial open champion Van Riper was forced to a third game by Edmontonian Mike Szkorupa before winning out 21-4, 9-21, 21-15. John Robbins of Edmonton won the A event consolation by defeating Jack Groff, also of Edmonton, 8-21, 21-4, 21-14.

Luck defeated Knobby Dzuren of Lethbridge in straight games 21-13, 21-20 to win the B event championship. The B-event consolation was won by Pic Piccini of Lethbridge 21-16, 21-13 over Barry Harper of Calgary.

Mrs. Dzuren had an unexpectedly easy time in her 2 straight 21-6, 21-6 victory over Sandy Van Riper of Edmonton in the women's open championship final. In contrast, the women's consolation final was closely contested, with Laurel Goodacre of Red Deer emerging the eventual victor over Marlene Prediger, also of Red Deer, by the scores of 19-21, 21-17, 21-18.

In the men's C event final, Isbister won the match by narrowly defeating Red Deer College's Lionel Leiske 21-10, 17-21, 21-16. Red Deer's Don Price had a slightly easier time in the C event consolation final as he defeated Jim Foote of Red Deer in straight games 21-12, 21-12.

All in all, the calibre of racquetball on display was the best ever seen in Red Deer and, based on the many favorable responses expressed by the participants, the College Athletic Board expects to sponsor a similar event again next year.
