LETHBRIDGE WINS IN A.C.A.C. MEN'S BASKETBALL

Lethbridge Kodiaks, defending Alberta and Western Canadian College champions, started the 1974-75 basketball season right where they left off last spring by capturing the A.C.A.C. Men's Pre-Season Tournament at Red Deer College this weekend with 3 decisive victories. Kodiaks defeated Camrose Lutheran 80-55 in the championship final, after defeating Red Deer 103-62 and N.A.I.T. 76-66 in earlier games. N.A.I.T. Ookpicks came back from their initial defeat to win the consolation.

Red Deer College Kings advanced to the championship semi-finals by defeating Medicine Hat Antelopes 72-59 in the best of the opening day's 7 games. Gord Graves led the Kings with 21 ppints and 13 rebounds; Murray McLean had 14 points and led the defence with 5 recoveries. Lionel Leiske had 12 points and 10 rebounds, while Rod Kennedy picked off 9 rebounds. However, the game's outstanding performance came in a losing cause. Big 6'4" forward Joe Grosswiler from Kalispell, Montana became the tournament's single-game high scorer as he picked up 38 points for the Antelopes.

Then, in their semi-final contest with the powerful Kodiaks, Kings trailed in the early going but came back to within 2 points 30-28 with 5 minutes remaining in the first The Kings defence, tenacious to that point, then seemed to wilt and the vaunted Lethbridge fastbreak struck swiftly to re-establish the Kodiaks lead, 45-33 at half-time. Kings were never able to recover their momentum in the second half, encountering a rash of costly fouls which ultimately cost the services of 5 players—Bill Bowd, Gord Graves, Lionel Leiske, Greg Lunde, and Rod Kennedy. Coupled with an ankle injury to Al Poytress, Kings played out the final 3 minutes of the game with only 4 players on the floor—Murray McLean, Rick David, Brian Bieber, and Keith Thompson. Gord Graves again led King's scorers with 18 points, followed by Leiske and McLean with 16 apiece.
